

DIRECTOR'S NOTES



There is a long history to the story you're about to see. The origins lie with the improvisational professional comedic theater that emerged during the Italian Renaissance 500 vears ago known as Commedia Dell'Arte. The thing I love about Commedia, is that it is free - in a way that most of western literature is not – from the notion that the principal subjects of its plays have to be admirable, or people we'd like to be in some way. In commedia everybody is an idiot about something. And this relaxes the audience because there's no pressure from these people. They are deeply flawed yet still charming enough for us to want to spend the evening with. It is their flaws that make it much easier to laugh at the absurd situations they find themselves in. Furthermore, they are flawed in ways we ourselves might sometimes be, and in laughing at them, we are given permission to laugh at ourselves.

What a relief.

I love the idea of setting this production in a television studio. In the 16th century, there were posh theaters where the elite would gather to watch plays (as well as show off what they were wearing and who they were with); but Commedia was happening in the streets for anyone to see. To me, television in the 1960s reached out to the general public in much the same way. You had to have a fair amount of money get dressed and go to the theater, but anyone could turn on the television and watch The Beverly Hillbillies or Bonanza.

This is not a show about how awful and degrading sexism is or the tragedy of being relentlessly overworked by one's employers. This play is about getting fed, getting shagged, and getting away with murder. Unlike classical and neoclassical tragedies, Commedia wasn't about searching for deeper life meanings; Commedia was about laughing, about making fun of the baser flaws we all walk around with. Not judging, not repairing even, just having fun and meeting the basic needs in life to be happy.

DRAMATURG'S NOTES

One Man, Two Guvnors takes place in 1963 in Brighton, England, and is a modernization of the 18th century Italian classic The Servant of Two Masters by Carlo Goldoni. Both of these plays are based on the Commedia Dell'Arte tradition that emerged during the Italian Renaissance. Commedia was a largely improvised form of theatre that was popular in the 16th to the 18th Centuries. Actors played Stock Characters with generic personalities particular for each character. The actors then were given a vague plot which they would improvise into a full play. Commedia influenced much of the theater that came after it, inspiring playwrights like William Shakespeare and Molieré.

Each character in One Man, Two Guvnors is based on of the Stock Characters from Commedia. Francis is our Arleccino or the Harlequin, the scheming servant who has a variety of appetites. Dolly is Colombina, the sassy maid who usually knows more than anyone else on stage. Alan & Pauline and Rachel & Stanley are the Innamorati, or ridiculously over the top lovers. Charlie is Pantalone, the wealthy older man. Harry Dangle is Il Dottore or the doctor, the comically inept older man who often thinks he knows more than he actually does. Lloyd is Brighella, another shrewd servant.

The premise of our production is that it is set in a 1960s style TV Studio during the recording of a show. It is as if the play is being filmed as an episode of a TV show. TV was a growing medium in the mid-20th Century. It revolutionized the way we connected to one another. News spread more quickly than before the Second World War. Important events were televised immediately. In Britain, the Queen's Coronation was an amazing sight that no one would forget. News about the JFK assassination was broadcast across the world for all to react to and to witness this tragic moment in time. TV brought us closer in that we could share beautiful and exciting moments and also tragic moments. It paved the way for internet and computers and to helped make the world a smaller, more connected place.
