Leadership Cafe- Habitat for Humanity Work Week Celebration

The Leadership Café group met on December 9th to celebrate the Successful Habitat for Humanity Work week. From October 6th through October 10th the Leadership Café, comprised of local high schools from the South Eastern Conference, worked together to refurbish homes in Racine. A over 200 students from Burlington, Case, Franklin, Horlick, Muskego, Oak Creek, Park, and South Milwaukee high schools worked with each other to make the community a little brighter. Not only did the students learn the value of hard work, but they also found it an opportunity to meet people from different backgrounds and get to know people from other schools. This activity helped to dissolve barriers. In addition to building the two homes, five of the schools held individual fundraisers for Habitat for Humanity.
