<sup>1</sup> ***Brown Bag Lunch Faculty Meeting: Critical Multiculturalism and Teaching:*** Critical multiculturalism synthesizes insights and principles from multicultural education, critical pedagogy, critical race theory, and postcolonialism. After discussing these areas and how they connect, Christine Sleeter will discuss their application to a degree program she led in California, and to other disciplines such as math, as presented by authors in a book she is co-editing."

<sup>2</sup> ***Synopsis of Lecture: Critical Family History, Race, and Historical Memory:*** Many people base fundamental understandings about race, the opportunity structure, and their own ethnic and cultural identities on their understandings of their family's historic experiences, which have usually been taught through family stories. For many people, and particularly those who are white, these remembrances involve a good deal of historical amnesia. Critical family history involves locating one's family history in a broader sociocultural and historical context. In this presentation, Sleeter will illustrate these ideas through her own family history research that uncovers constructions of white privilege.
