Dreaming of baseball and girls, Eugene must cope with adolescent "challenges" while also dealing with a family that is fighting hard times and a world that is becoming increasingly less innocent. This bittersweet and humorous story has amazing relevance for today – and offers us an optimistic hope for a better tomorrow.

Lydia's immediate and seemingly miraculous bond with the girl sets the entire family on a mysterious and shocking journey of discovery. *Lydia* is an unflinching and deeply emotional portrait of a Mexican immigrant family caught in a web of dark secrets. **This play contains mature themes, language, and situations.**

In the Blood
