## Description:

On this program, we will spend 9 days in Chiang Mai, Thailand. Known as the "Rose of the North," Chiang Mai was once the center of the Tai Kingdom of Lanna. It is the most ethnically diverse region of Thailand as well as the most mountainous.


We start with a welcome dinner of traditional Northern Thai foods on the first day. In following six days, students will receive lectures and tours guided by experts, including excursions to the Old City of Chiang Mai, a variety of local Thai Buddhist temples, visits to local markets, and even a cooking class. We will also visit Doi Inthanon National Park. The academic program will include classroom instruction, field excursions, and frequent lectures by local activists, scholars, and representatives of organizations working on issues of local sustainability, cultural preservation, human rights, and other issues. Students will then have volunteer opportunities with local non-profits such as the Soi Dog Foundation (rescuing street dogs from the dog meet trade), upland ethnic minority (such as the Hmong, the Karen, and the Lisu) social justice and development organizations, and others.
