While women in the United States are celebrating 100 years of being privileged to vote, suffrage movements have seen similar pathways within the continents of the Americas. How women achieved the suffrage varies in each political landscape; similarities will be explored.

Women organized across country lines, from South America to Canada, encouraging others on toward progress. Any advance in any country in the Americas always spurred workers in other countries to publish the news in their own publications. Due to this momentum, votes for women progressed from the near impossible prior to World War I to the passage of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1945.
