Great Decisions is a discussion program offered through the Foreign Policy Association. Founded in 1918, the FPA, through balanced, nonpartisan programs and publications, encourages citizens to participate in the U.S. foreign policy process. The Great Decisions program has been in existence for 60 years. It is adapted to multiple formats, including informal discussion groups, public lectures and formal secondary and university courses.

The All Great Decisions group uses the informal discussion format. Published annually by the FPA, the Great Discussions briefing book with eight timely foreign policy topics serves as the text to read and study before each topic discussion and along with a DVD presentation on the date of the session, it provides background information, expert analysis and suggested questions for each foreign policy issue under discussion. Program is the oldest and largest grass-roots world affairs educational program of its kind in the country. The 2017 topics are: European Union, Trade Policy, South China Sea, Saudi Arabia, Geopolitics of Energy, Latin America, Afghanistan/Pakistan and Nuclear Security.

The briefing books are pre-ordered by the coordinators once members have signed on to participate and paid for the book. Sign-up takes place in October of each year for the following year's participation. The books are printed in December by the FPA and distributed the following January. Sessions are scheduled once each month for 8 months, February through September. Tentative dates and times are the 2nd Wednesday of the month, 1:00 – 2:00 pm, in Tallent Hall, Rooms 182 and Orchard Room.

The Cultural Connection Program pairs UW-Parkside international and exchange students with members of the community. Similar to a host family program, it has no live-in component. The CCP is a great opportunity to foster relationships with incoming international students and make them feel welcome at UW-Parkside and in the USA. As a host, you share culture, tradition and favorite things/pastimes with the student, as the student's role is to share the same with you! This program aims to provide opportunity to develop mutually beneficial relationships through interacting and engaging with people from diverse backgrounds and cultures.

What will the student and I do together? What should I expect?

There are no limits on how often CCP students and hosts meet/spend time together. The growth and maintenance of the relationship is completely up to you! **Some ideas for mutual activities include:** inviting students for holiday events (Independence Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas, etc.), touring and shopping trips, having a meal together, etc. Hosts are not expected to support their student financially, provide lodging or get involved in any legal situations.
