We meet monthly on the second Monday of the month at 1:00PM in the Orchard Room of Tallent Hall. New members are always welcome!

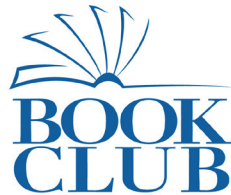
