Thursday, August 9 - The Red Violin

(prior to Ravinia trip) composer John Corigiliano, Dr. Laura Rexroth

We'll explore the connections between the film plot and its music, composed by Pulitzer Prize-winning composer John Corigliano, as well as sampling his other music as Corigliano celebrates his 80th birthday this year! A good background for the trip to Ravinia later in the month.

Tuesday, August 14 - Elder Law

Matt Hayes and Laura Zimmer of Marquette University

Attorney Matthew Hayes will offer an overview of common, yet important, issues associated with estate planning, advance directives (Power of Attorney and Living Will), probate, long-term care and government benefits available for long-term care.

Fridays, Sept 7 & 14 – Dr. Sandra Moats will be speaking about Prelude to the Civil War (in the Cinema).
This two-session class focuses on the territorial expansion accompanying the Mexican American War (1846-1848) and its explosive political aftermath. Expanding the nation's size also meant the potential extension of slavery into the West. In attempting to resolve this debate, the politics of the 1850s merely exacerbated tensions over slavery. With the South fearing the loss of their slaves and the North wanting to limit slavery's expansion, a war over slavery's future eventually occurred.
