Plant ecologist, Dr. David Rogers, explores the history of the “green revolution” which has produced not only unprecedented abundance of cheap food, but also significant declines in soil and water quality, biodiversity, human health and animal welfare. Sustainable agriculture seeks to retain productivity in a way that minimizes these negative impacts. Innovations in plant and animal breeding and farming techniques strive to meet ever-increasing needs of human population and challenges imposed by global warming. Innovators like Will Allen and his non-profit “Growing Power” face challenges in demonstrating the economic viability of sustainable food production, particularly as consumer demand for “organic” and “sustainable” products increases.





A TRIBUTE TO JULIE RAE FRIEDMAN

Dr. Julie Rae Friedman, 84, of Pleasant Prairie, died Saturday April 21, 2018, at the Hospice Alliance-Hospice House in Pleasant Prairie.

She earned a bachelor of science degree in Food and Nutrition from Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y., a master of arts in Nutrition and Dietetics from NYU and her doctorate in Nutrition from NYU as well. She married Louis T. Friedman on Dec. 27, 1968, and he opened the world to her. The family traveled extensively throughout the world!

When moving to Wis. from N.Y. in 1998, Julie continued her love for learning with ALL – eventually having the honor to serve as President of the organization. She was thrilled to to work on the Day Trip Committee and always managed to incorporate an ethnic restaurant to introduce a new culture to the members. She initiated Ethnic Dinning which was very popular (her favorite foods were from India and she wanted everyone else to love it too!).
