## May 26 ~ Push and Shove in English Gothic Architecture



In the middle ages, beauty was a matter of scientific fact. Artists and architects knew what it looked like and what it could do: manifest God. Ordinary people – they knew what they liked just as we do today.

Suppose you were an architect who designed a scientifically beautiful building and it successfully manifested God. What do you think might happen to that building? Could it hold Him in? Might it collapse? Might He hold it up? Or might He bring the stone to life? Might you, like the sorcerer's apprentice, have started something you could not control or stop?

If you, too, know what medieval scientific beauty looked like, and how a vault holds itself up, then you can enjoy the vigorous, fun (but always respectful) game of power between the royal architects of the buildings and the divine Architect of the Universe. Two or three rules of thumb will do it. Come and find out. No Gothic building will ever be the same again!



Pippin Michelli earned her PhD in Medieval art from the University of East Anglia, Norwich, UK, and has taught at all levels, especially in universities, liberal arts colleges, and dedicated art schools.
