Remember, in the U.S., it wasn't until 1920 that the states signed a constitutional amendment banning voting discrimination by sex. Less than a century later, the rise of the female worker has added nearly 2 percentage points per year to GDP growth. In Europe, economists estimated that the shrinking gap between male and female employment contributed 25% of Europe's growing wealth in the last two decades. As the *Economist* once put it: More than China, more than the Internet, and more than banks and central banking, economic growth is driven by women. "

Farida Khan is Professor of Economics at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside, and has served there as Chair of Economics, Director of both the Center for International Studies and Center for Ethnic Studies. She is a long time member of the steering committee for the Center for Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies.

Dr. Khan's recent work focuses on questions of indigenous peoples, labor, and gender in Bangladesh. She has co-edited several books, including *Contemporary Economic Issues in Bangladesh (2006), Recreating the Commons? NGOs in Bangladesh (2009), Bangladesh Economy in the 21*st *Century (2011),* and an upcoming volume, *Money and Credit.* She has also

published on different aspects of economic development in peer reviewed journals and book chapters. Professor Khan has held leadership positions in professional organizations, including the International Association for Feminist Economics, which is the leading organization for and by women economists in the US and other countries. Her specialization within economics is International Trade, and she teaches courses in International Trade and International Monetary Economics.
