DEAN WALKER'S UPDATE

Back in June of 2020 when UW-Parkside was planning for an academic year with COVID, I challenged the College's faculty and staff to make this upcoming year an impactful and rich learning experience for our students. Faculty and staff exceeded all expectations. So many of our students had an amazing year, despite the pandemic. The academic year demanded that we reach deep into the well of our creativity and we did. There, we discovered extraordinary inventiveness and resilience. We could not be prouder of our students, faculty, and staff!

- Our Theatre Arts Department mounted five fully produced plays that were livestreamed to hundreds of viewers. One of these plays, Stupid F**king Bird, was selected by the Kennedy Center College Theatre Festival (KCACTF) to be viewed and critiqued by theater professionals. Students also had the opportunity to dialog with the playwright himself, Aaron Posner. Two students took first place at the regional competition in lighting and sound— Jessica Baker and Jack Purves. They are competing this month in the national finals, virtually, at the Kennedy Center in Washington DC.
- The Music Department confronted the constraints of COVID by establishing a series
 of conversations and short concerts of recorded music by faculty and students, called
 Melodious Mondays. As with so many musical groups nationwide, they kept the music going
 via Facebook Live throughout the summer and spring. As part of the MM series, David
 Mason, principal violist of the Tokyo Philharmonic Orchestra and this years Howard Brown
 Visiting Artist in Residence, regaled us with a concert in March.
- The Communication Department invited Monique Herena, Chief Colleague Experience Officer at American Express, to be their keynote speaker for Communication Week. The department hosts this event each year. It is organized by students as an opportunity for networking with communication professionals, who are usually UWP alumni. Ms. Herena was selected as the 2019 Distinguished Alumna in the College of Arts and Humanities.
- The Digital Media and Production (DMAP) team developed livestreaming internships for the academic year. Some 13 students from Theatre and Communication departments participated in this exceptional opportunity to learn to use digital cameras for livestreamed events. The students streamed concerts, plays, a musical, artist workshops, recruiting events and much, much more.
- Finally, we want to say another heartfelt congratulations to our Chancellor Awardee from the December 2020 graduation, Mariana Nelson (Graphic Design), and our two Outstanding Graduates for May 2021, Karolina Dryndak (Communication) and Kevin Phair (Liberal Studies).

College of Business, Economics, and Computing

DEAN BALDWIN'S UPDATE

The faculty and staff of the College of Business, Economics, and Computing (CBEC) congratulate all of the Academic Achievement Award (AAA) winners. We applaud your outstanding accomplishments and marvel at your persistence, leadership, and ingenuity during this difficult time. CBEC achievements in 2020-2021 are due to the hard work of the students, faculty, and staff. The highlights include the following:

- CBEC students, again, made their mark at national competitions. In the fall, Cassidy Prucha won
 the Set Sail portion of the International Collegiate Sales Competition. Cassidy competed against
 140 competitors in the competition and met with 23 companies over a two-week period to secure
 the victory. UW-Parkside's national reputation in sales continued in the spring. Chandler Spiewak
 is the National Shore Sales Competition champion. Chandler competed against 87 other students
 from universities such as Kansas, Penn State, Temple, and Florida State. Chandler was voted as
 the best student at the competition by industry judges. UW-Parkside's team finished fourth out
 of 44 teams at the competition. Finally, a team of Computer Science, MSCIS and MIS students
 finished in the top 25% of all teams in the National Cyber League cybersecurity competition. This
 is an outstanding showing in UW-Parkside's first appearance in this competition.
- Through the initiative and hard work of students, the App Factory has finally moved from a garage motif to a more modern workplace. Salina Servantez, a recent graduate in Computer Science and Psychology, led the remodeling effort to create App Factory 2.0 and coined the motto, "A woman-friendly design with everyone in mind." The App Factory continues to work on new types of projects, expanding into Internet of Things, Virtual Reality, and Data Analytics.
- CBEC continues its mission to work with the community. In addition to the App Factory, the Ralph Jaeschke Solutions for Economic Growth Center, ITPC, and Small Business Development Center (SBDC) makes an impact on the community. The SBDC helped 40 small business owners in Kenosha in 28 different industries in response to the Covid-19 recession. In addition, they worked with multiple Kenosha downtown business owners who were affected by the riots. CBEC looks forward to working with the new Center for Research in Innovation and Smart Cities, directed by Dr. George Vukotich.
- The business program went through a rigorous and successful continuous improvement review by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business – International (AACSB) in the fall. As a result, AACSB accreditation was extended for the next five years. The process included a review of the Flex Bachelor of Science in Business Administration (Flex BSBA). Flex BSBA is the only competency-based education (CBE) business program in the world that is accredited by AACSB and now it is the only CBE program that has gone through a successful AACSB continuous improvement review. Flex BSBA is designed to help non-traditional students obtain a business degree. We are grateful to the many CBEC students who participated in the process.
- The Human Resource Management concentration within the Business Management degree has been approved by the Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) as an Academically Aligned Program. This means that the program is listed in the SHRM directory and UW-Parkside students are eligible to apply for the SHRM-CP exam.

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BUSINESS

Throughout Briana's academic journey, she has done much outside of the virtual classroom. She was a business development specialist for Mazda, was promoted to a business specialist for Chevrolet, and later advanced to the position of Business Development Manager for a Germanbased e-commerce company. College of Natural and Health Sciences

DEAN OTU'S UPDATE

When we went on the covid-19 pandemic lockdown in March 2020, research was halted. The fate of research animals and plants were a big concern. Faculty and students, especially those working on their research and planning to graduate were in panic. We responded by sorting through the many projects, working with faculty and students to designate many as 'essential staff' of the university. Doing so brought relief. We also had to grapple with the numerous students whose internship sites closed or went virtual. Still, we worked out an arrangement for each student to get this high impact experience. Working with the Provost's covid-19 restart team, a 'Research Continuity Task force swiftly made recommendations that would allow faculty and students engaged in research to return to their laboratories in a logical and organized manner. Over summer 2020 faculty/research students, who felt comfortable and wanted to do so, returned to their research laboratories.

- The 6th Annual Community and Alumni event was hosted virtually with livestreaming. The event offered six topical areas: (I) Forever Chemicals: The Next Generation Threat; (II) Racial Equity and Environmental Justice; (III) Exercise Science Professions in the Era of Covid-19; (IV) Covid-19 Pandemic from the Front Lines; (V) Social Stigma and Mental Well-Being in the face of a Pandemic; and (VI) COVID-19 and Sports. Each of the six topics had three breakout sessions. The event culminated with a plenary on Climate Change.
- Associate Professor of Chemistry, Dr. Francis Mann, was named the 2020 Carl Gulbrandsen Innovator of the Year and will receive the UW System 2021-2022 Regent Scholar Award; Assistant Professor of Physics, Dr. Bom Soo Kim, received the 2020-2021 WiSys Spark grant for his project "Improving the accuracy of the chiral magnetic skyrmion motion in the racetrack memory devices," with funding to support undergraduate research students at UW-Parkside; Two of Parkside's Molecular Biology and Bioinformatics (MBB) students earned American Society for Biochemistry and Molecular Biology (ASMB) certification with distinction, and one MBB student earned ASBMB certification. Of the 926 students in ASBMB-accredited programs who took the exam nationwide, 374 (40.4%) achieved certification. A total of 154 of these (16.6% of the total) achieved certification with distinction; Two issues of the Parkside Journal of Science were published. A very first of its kind, a journal edited entirely by CNHS students under the supervision of Assistant Professor of Physics, Dr. Hom Kandel.
- The renovation of GRNQ 220 into an interactive classroom and GRNQ 370 into a biotechnology laboratory is nearing completion. The former space will enable an increase in the Nursing Clinical Phase admittance by up to 60%
- The college rolled over its 2014-2019 Strategic Plan to 2020-2025, with minor tweaks. Even within the restrictions imposed on the world by the covid-19 pandemic, faculty, instructional academic staff and staff in the college strove to excellence as described below.
- In addition to the scramble to ensure research students completed their work to meet Spring 2020 graduation, and animals and plants were cared for during the pandemic, a Task Force on Research Continuity met and quickly drew up guidelines for faculty and students to return to research/creative work in a safe way.
- Dr. Melissa Gregg is a Co-PI on a recently awarded grant from the National Science Foundation: Project Title: Essential Decision-Making Skills for the Future Workforce in Smart Manufacturing Co-PI's: Drs. Theresa Castor and Peggy James.
- Dr. Sandra Millon-Underwood received the American Cancer Society Champion of Hope Award for her contributions to advancing the Society's mission and helping save lives from cancer. Dr. Underwood has dedicated her career to addressing cancer disparities by connecting women, at-risk, and medically underserved minority populations to cancer prevention and early detection information and programs. She has also received research funding from the American Cancer Society, including a Professorship of Oncology Nursing in 1998.

- CSSPS partnered with the Center for Business and Civic Engagement to do the 2020 Election Experience. Faculty from across campus did brown bags on politics and the voting experience, four student interns led voter registration events (including our Pumpkin Patch event!), signature events with Fair Maps, Charles Franklin (MU Law School Polls) and Courageous Conversations with Kenosha Coalition for Dismantling Racism made our campus aware, involved, and engaged.
- CSSPS continued its leadership in serving the Hispanic Community on and off campus. Descubre Parkside, a Spanish language recruitment event for middle schoolers, went virtual this year with 25 families attending. In Spring, CSSPS partnered to offer our second Voz del Pueblo, to facilitate critical and constructive conversations surrounding the Parkside experience. As of Spring 2021, 20% of our students are Hispanic!
- Center for Research in Innovation and Smart Cities opened in Spring 2021, with Founding Director Dr. George Vukotich. With a mission to work with government, businesses, universities, and citizens, the center began groundbreaking work in smart city initiatives, economic development, and technology training for the future.
