More about *Teaching Financial Crises*:

The lessons accommodate active learning components that can incorporate differentiated learning styles. The curriculum has been aligned to economics content standards (Wisconsin Economics Performance Standards D.8: 5, 6, 8, 10 and 11; D.12: 4, 5, 9, 11 and 14); and was written to include evergreen lessons that allow them to be of continual use. It is comprised of a variety of approaches to encourage higher-order thinking skills designed to assist students to engage in effective decision-making, undertake reasoned approaches to economic analysis, efficiently solve complex problems, and apply critical thinking skills.

Dr. Norm Cloutier is the Director of the Center for Economic Education and Professor of Economics at UW-Parkside. Professor Cloutier has three times received the UW-Parkside Stella C.
